Dr. Richard Guarasci President- Wagner College

Dr. Richard Guarasci is the 18th President of Wagner College, where he was previously the Provost and Senior Vice President, responsible for academic and student affairs, admissions and support service in addition to serving as the chief operating officer. He holds the rank of Professor of Political Science and he teaches in the areas of democracy, citizenship and American diversity.At Wagner, Dr. Guarasci founded the Wagner Plan for the Practical Liberal Arts, the four-year curriculum for all undergraduates that draws

together a substantive liberal arts core into a series of learning communities and experiential learning tutorials.Dr. Guarasci was Dean of the College and Professor of Political Science at Hobart College from 1992 to 1997. Previously he served as Dean and founding Director of the First-Year Program at St. Lawrence University, a nationally celebrated model program of democratic living and learning required for all first-year students that joined first-year housing with a two-semester schedule.Dr. Guarasci is a coauthor of "Democratic Education in the Age of Difference: Redefining Citizenship in Higher Education" (Jossey-Bass, 1997) and of numerous other publications, including three books, more than 20 articles and more than 50 conference presentations. He is now a national leader in higher education with many speaking engagements throughout the United States. He is an active educational consultant for more than 20 universities and colleges. Time Magazine selected him as a National Undergraduate Educator and he received awards from the Sears Foundation, the Glitz Family Prize and many other citations including a day of recognition by proclamation of the City Council in Geneva, New York. The Staten Island Civic Association cited him for public service on Staten Island. He is currently chairman of the board for Campus Compact and president of the Coalition of Urban and Metropolitan Universities and a member of the board of the Association of American Colleges and Universities. His is immediate past chairman of the New American Colleges & Universities and a former chairman of the New York State Higher Education Services Corporation. He is a Fellow of the Society for Values in Higher Education and a PEW Foundation Fellow with the Washington Center for Learning in building natural leadership in Learning Communities. He is a member of the faculty for the Asheville Institute and an Advising Board Member for the Models for Democracy Project of SVHE.Dr. Guarasci wrote "Developing the Democratic Arts" for About Campus (Feb. 2001) and "On Becoming the Good College: Lessons Learned" for Liberal Education (Aug. 2002). The Huffington Post published Dr. Guarasci's essay on "Civic Engagement: Matching Students' Wants With Communities' Needs" (May 19, 2015).Dr. Guarasci holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Fordham University. He earned his M.A. in Economics and his Ph.D. in Political Science from Indiana University.

Deputy Borough President

Edward Burke is the Staten Island Deputy Borough President, appointed by Borough President (BP) James S. Oddo. Mr. Burke has served in government on Staten Island for 30 years. As Deputy Borough President, Mr. Burke works closely with BP Oddo and his staff on public policy, community issues and special projects for the office, including parks and recreation, cultural attractions, youth and quality of life issues. Mr. Burke also specializes in promoting Staten Island's special places, advancing the Island's motto as a "The Borough of Parks." He also coordinated BP Oddo's

recent Young Writers Roundtable, encouraging students to hone their writing skills. He has served on numerous boards including: United Activities Unlimited and the Staten Island Zoological Society. In 2009, Mr. Burke served on the New York City Board of Education as the Staten Island representative when the Board was briefly reconstituted. Mr. Burke has been Staten Island Deputy Borough President since November of 2006, appointed by then-BP James P. Molinaro. He has served on the staff in the Borough President's office since 1990, coming on board in the administration of BP Guy V. Molinari. Mr. Burke earned his undergraduate degree in English from Wagner College in 1980 and his Masters Degree in Public Administration from Baruch College in 1997.

Director, Office of the Staten Island Borough President

Dr. Ginny Mantello is a Neuroradiologist who received her sub-specialty training at Montefiore Medical Center and Albert Einstein College of Medicine, where she continues to practice. In March 2014, Dr. Mantello was appointed by the Borough President to be the Director of Health and Wellness for Staten Island. In this position Dr. Ginny aspires to bring to the community all that she has been implementing at the hospitals with the hope of creating a borough wide culture of health. Through her office, she has promoted numerous initiatives for Islanders, including various

initiatives around childhood obesity and Behavioral Health. She is currently actively educating Colleges and High Schools on establishing Youth Based Wellness Committees and is also involved in various Island wide population health improvement projects. Dr. Mantello has received multiple awards for Community Service and Chairs multiple Health Committees. She sits on steering committees of multiple Coalitions including the Tackling Youth Substance Abuse Coalition formed to address the Opioid and Heroin epidemic on Staten Island.

Gonzalo Mercado is the Executive Director of the Staten Island Community Job Center and the New York Coordinator of the National Day Laborer Organizing Network (NDLON) Gonzalo has over ten years of experience working with low wage immigrant workers through grassroots organizing and leadership development. He has been at the forefront of local, national and international initiatives aimed at improving the lives and working conditions of immigrant families. Gonzalo serves on the board of the New York Immigration Coalition, the North Star Fund, the

Lower East Side People's Federal Credit Union and is a trustee of the Ghanaian Association of Staten Island. He earned a BS degree in Business Management from Touro College and is a graduate of Columbia University's Non-profit Management Institute, CORO NY Leadership Center and the Aspen Institute for Emerging Non Profit Leaders.



DB Lampman

Co-founder Staten Island MakerSpace

DB Lampman is the co-founder and Associate Director of Staten Island MakerSpace. She oversees all administrative and programming at the MakerSpace, including educationprograms for children and adults, STEAM programs for schools, libraries, and other CBOs, marketing, development and fundraising. In the two years since starting Staten Island MakerSpace, DB has developed and overseen over 600 education workshops and provided education programs to approximately 4,000 children. DB holds a BFA from Maryland Institute, College of Art and an

MFA from the School of Visual Arts. DB is a working artist who specializes in mixed media sculpture and performance art. Her work has been exhibited internationally at places such as the Brooklyn Museum and the Museum of Contemporary Art in Rome. Recent projects include "The Dance," a large-scale public art sculpture exhibited at Tappen Park and Conference House Park in Staten Island as part of NYC Parks Department Art in the Parks program.
