

Italians who came to America fleeing Fascism



Gianna Pontercoboli, Italian-born journalist, UN Correspondent and author, *Americordo: The Italian Jewish Exiles in America*

Forced to leave by rising persecution, one thousand Italian Jews came to America, to continue their work from mathematics to music. Pontercoboli retraces their strategies to find a visa, to weave networks of support and to confront fascism and anti-fascism in the U.S. Four of those who remained in America won the Nobel prize, while others built enduring bridges between America and Italy.
