

Plagues, Outbreaks, and Biological Warfare

Do you wonder how people become sick; how one person infects another; which organisms cause illness and how they are controlled?

July 12 to July 31

These and other questions will be explored in this course with an introduction to the pathogens that cause diseases. We will study the basic structure and function of bacteria, viruses, and parasites.


We will also read about and discuss epidemics with an emphasis on how scientists discovered, treated, and halted the spread of these illnesses and how the diseases shaped societies. Present-day epidemics will be examined with some attention given to future epidemic threats. In addition to classroom lectures and discussions, we will be working in the laboratory learning proper techniques for handling and culturing bacteria.

Finally, we will take our new-found knowledge on weekly field trips to various venues in Manhattan that relate to the course.



History of New York

New York City boasts the nation's richest treasure trove of cultural sites and historic landmarks. Energized by change, enriched by immigrants and entrepreneurs, and enlivened by provocative artistic and political leaders, New York became a premier global center of creativity and innovation.

History of New York City explores the history of New York City and will cover topics including; September 11th, the rise of Wall Street, the Civil War Draft Riots, the Harlem Renaissance, and the impact of immigration.

You will learn about political, cultural and economic transformations in the classroom and see their impact first-hand at sites in all five boroughs of New York City. Trips may include: The Museum of Finance, the African Burial Ground, the Lower East Side Tenement Museum, Central Park, the New York Historical Society, the Museum of Modern Art, 9/11 Museum, and walking tours of neighborhoods.



The Wager College Dance Intensive program provides both intermediate and advanced high school students an opportunity to immerse themselves in an intensive week of dance, learning technique and musical theatre dance performance with Rusty Curcio, Wagner College's head dance instructor. We will also work on more contemporary forms of jazz and theatre dance with master dance instructor, Kari Williams.

You will receive the most rigorous dance training in both jazz and musical theatre dance. You will also have the opportunity to spend time in Manhattan at a professional dance event, enjoying the excitement and intrigue of the city.

This intensive will incorporate elements of DA301: Musical Theatre Styles, a practical open level dance class geared to styles of dance used in musical theatre and DA 262: Jazz II, a practical, intermediate level of jazz focusing on strengthening technique.

The Summer Music Theatre Institute (SMTI) gives high school students from around the country the opportunity to learn from theatre professionals in the Wagner College and New York City community about all aspects of music theatre performance. In this two-week, on-campus intensive, you will receive rigorous, college caliber training in acting, singing, improvisation, and dancing-taught in a supportive, professional environment. You will also gain insights into the professional world of New York City theatre through visits from industry experts and trips to Broadway productions.

The intensive culminates in a showcase of student performances for family, friends, and the Wagner community. SMTI will give you a learning experience that is professional and positive-rigorous training and serious fun. Past SMTI students have visited and spoken with the stars of productions including *Memphis*, *Evita*, and *Billy Elliot*. Each student also participates in a professional photography session and receives a CD of the shots.

College Credit

Each program offers you the opportunity to earn college credit for the rigorous training and classroom instruction and off campus venues that you will participate in. Each of the academic programs (Science & Literature and History & Literature) will grant 2 units per program or the equivalent of 6 credits that are generally transferrable at other similar colleges. The Summer Music Theatre Institute (SMTI) will provide 1 unit or the equivalent of 3 credits that are also generally transferrable. The Dance Intensive will provide 1/2 unit or equivalent of 1.5 credits generally transferrable. Upon successful completion of all programs and coursework, students will receive an official Wagner College transcript reflecting credits earned.

Typical Schedule

On the first day, you will arrive and have a chance to get situated in your dorm room. Parents and students will be invited to a welcome reception where you will have an opportunity to meet your professors, other instructors, staff, and fellow students.

Your program will begin the following day with breakfast in the Wagner Dining Hall and then on to your chosen classes. Typically, the academic classes will meet mornings and afternoons, with field trips to Manhattan and other venues scheduled once or twice a week and during the weekends. When on campus, breakfast, lunch, and dinner will be served in the dining hall. When not in class, or traveling to NYC sights, you will participate in informal workshops about college admissions, college life, time management, study skills, and more. And, of course, time will be devoted to your coursework. Group study halls will be scheduled during the evening and weekends.

Our Summer Music Theatre Institute (SMTI) provides a rigorous schedule of professional training both on and off campus. Expect some late nights as you attend Broadway shows and enjoy workshops and visits from guest artists who are working professionals. You can expect intensive training and a lot of fun! Programs will culminate with a final showcase, performance, or reception for students and parents on the final day.

Campus Life

On Wagner's Campus overlooking the Manhattan skyline and New York Harbor, you will get to be part of the city, while living on a tranquil, 110-acre residential campus on Staten Island.

During your time here, you will be living in one of our four dorms equipped with Wi-Fi and amazing views of the surrounding area. Student lounges are located on all residence floors for social gatherings or for just spending time reading or socializing with new friends.

Commuter Students

All programs are open to local commuter students at a reduced rate. Commuter students are required to attend all class sessions and field trips. They will not reside on campus for the program.

Program Value

Dollar for dollar, the tuition for the Summer Pre-College Program is a substantial savings of more than half the regular cost of college credit courses at Wagner College, and similar institutions. These same courses cost more than double for those enrolled as a degree student. Aside from the enormous financial savings, the benefit of experiencing college life first hand will pave the way and provide a solid point of reference as you continue your college search.

FAQs

Q Who can attend the Pre-College Program?

A| Any student who has completed his/her sophomore, one or to junior or senior year of high school by June of the current theater. year may attend the Pre-College Program.

Q Do students receive college credit for participating in the program?

A Yes, students can receive up to 6 transferrable college credits depending on which program they enroll in.

Q| Do participants have to reside on campus?

A| With the exception of SMTI, our program is also available to commuter students as well.

Q| Where will students live? Where will students eat?

A Pre-College students will live in one of Wager College's dorms and eat in the college's cafeteria.

Q Are the students supervised?

A| Students will be supervised by both a
Resident Director (full-time staff member) and
Residential Assistants. Our primary goal is to make sure
the students are safe during their time on campus.
Students will be supervised 24 hours per day.

Q Is there a dress code?

A | There is no dress code for the Pre-College Program. We recommend that students wear cool, comfortable clothing. Residential students might also want to bring one or two nice outfit for activities such as trips to the theater

Q How much do books and course materials cost?

A | The cost of books and materials varies from class to class.

Q Do students have access to campus facilities?

A| Students have access to Wagner College's classrooms, laboratories, on-campus cafés, library, computer labs, and athletic center.

Q Are there scholarships available?

A| Not at this time.

Q| Will I have access to a computer? Should I bring a laptop?

A It is recommended to bring a laptop but not required. Students have access to computer laboratories throughout the campus.

Q Do classes include field trips?

A| Field trips are planned throughout the duration of the program, most of which will be required venues that relate to coursework. Parent permission slips must be returned to attend field trips.

Tuition and Payment

Tuition includes course fees inclusive of credit transcript, housing, meals, and entrance and transportation fees for required venues. Any required course textbooks are additional.
