## Wagner President Guarasci feted at Ritz

Some 350 made their way across the bay Friday night to the Ritz-Carlton in Manhattan's Battery Park to celebrate 10 years of service by Wagner College President Dr. Richard Guarasci.

But the \$400 price for a seat didn't just go toward the dinner. Besides honoring Guarasci, the event was a fundraiser to help construct a new building for the school—The Center for Global Learning on the old campus of Augustinian Academy on Grymes Hill, closed decades ago and purchased by Wagner.

District Attorney Dan Donovan was there, as was Deputy Borough President Ed Burke. Supreme Court Justices Phil Minardo and Steve Rooney celebrated with the crowd.

Guarasci was praised for the rehabilitation of the campus' Main Hall, as well as the construction of an academic building, Founders Hall. Guarasci created an innovative academic program, dubbed the Wagner Plan, and dramatically increased the school's endowment.

Video presentations from Borough President James Molinaro and Mayor Mike Bloomberg also praised Guarasci's 10 years at the school.

And perhaps the best part of the evening were skits by students from the Wagner College theater department — hailed for decades as the next-best-thing to Broadway, right here on Staten Island.
