The Wagner College freshman plans on majoring in nternational business with a double major or minor in her true passion: French.

"I've always loved French," says Bayer, who started studying the Romance language in the seventh grade.

The 18-year-old Connecticut native caught the travel bug after a People to People Student Ambassador trip around Europe before her senior year of high school.

"Now I just want to travel everywhere," she says.
